# Welcome to The Arc of Massachusetts

Established more than 70 years ago,
The Arc of Massachusetts enhances the
lives of the more than 200,000 people with
intellectual and developmental disabilities
(IDD) and autism in our Commonwealth and
their families. With our 17 chapters across
Massachusetts, we advocate for supports and
community-based services such as family
support, employment, recreation,
and residential.

Families banded together in the 1950s to change policies and practices. In the 1960s, special education and de-institutionalization took center stage. In the 1970s, 'normalization' became the watchword for services and The Arc advocated for a life in the community. The Arc led the push for funding for adult supports (Turning 22) in the 1980s. In the 2000s, we successfully advocated for the 2,437 individuals on waiting lists to receive the community-based supports and placements they deserved. In the 2010s, The Arc played a key role in passage of five key pieces of legislation: Real Lives, the Autism Omnibus bill, the National Background Check, a data study of autism, and Nicky's Law, which created a registry of care providers substantiated of abuse.

The 2020s have brought many challenges for our community. The coronavirus pandemic resulted in loss of services, programs closing, behaviors regressing, and an increase in isolation. At the same time, the shortage of direct support professionals has progressed into a crisis, which has caused thousands of families across the state to take on full-time caregiver duties. Despite the many challenges that our community has faced in recent years, The Arc has had multiple crucial accomplishments. We successfully advocated time and again for people with IDD and autism to be prioritized during the dark days of the pandemic. Our tireless advocacy has resulted in historic funding increases in crucial DDS line items and the direct support workforce. Operation House Call was fully funded and signed into law.

The Arc remains at the forefront of the fight for better lives for people with IDD and autism. The Arc works to ensure the rights of people with disabilities, obtain funding for support services, and seek the passage of good policies and laws.

In the coming years, The Arc of Massachusetts will continue to address the dire state of the direct support workforce shortage crisis; advocating for the needs of those thousands of individuals with disabilities who have gone unserved or underserved for years; filing and refiling our priority legislation as needed; and advocating for the necessary increases in funding in each fiscal year state budget. Through our advocacy trainings and webinars, information and referral responses, and our work on Beacon Hill and Capitol Hill, The Arc will continue the fight to ensure that all persons with IDD and autism have the equal rights they deserve.

# Changing the Lives of People with Disabilities through Equity and Empowerment

### **EQUITY IN ACTION**

Operation House Call (OHC) is creating inclusive healthcare spaces by teaching thousands of future healthcare professionals essential skills and mindsets to enhance the healthcare of persons with autism and intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). Families, parents, and individual self-advocates serve as educators in a field that seldom focuses on more than a diagnosis. It is a rare and important training opportunity for students at Boston University School of Medicine, Harvard Medical School, Simmons School of Nursing and Health Sciences, Tufts Medical School, UMass Chan Medical School, UMass Graduate School of Nursing, and Yale School of Nursing. Through OHC, students begin to build confidence and interest in working and becoming champions for individuals with autism and IDD and their families.

Widening the Circle – Pathways to Friendship explores the benefits of relationships between people with and without disabilities and provides information on engaging in and sustaining those relationships. Building friendships can be especially challenging for people who have disabilities, whose relationships are often limited to family, paid staff, and others with disabilities. All people benefit from a diversity of relationships.

**SUPPORTbrokers** assists persons with disabilities achieve their vision through planning, education, and advocacy. Consumers or families hire a support broker to help them find services and supports to thrive in their community. Brokers can help consumers find transportation, a place to live, someone to help them with daily living skills, a job counselor, and other linkages. They also can facilitate and create a person-centered plan and help consumers apply for Social Security or health insurance, among other benefits.

## **EMPOWERMENT, EDUCATION, AND OUTREACH**

The Arc of Massachusetts is a leader in advocacy on both the state and federal levels to obtain services and supports for people of all ages and across the spectrum of autism, cerebral palsy, Down syndrome, and other IDD. This includes advocacy for appropriately funded state budgets and critically needed legislation. The Arc's Government Affairs team ensures that elected leaders and public officials understand the needs of our constituents. We advance progressive regulations or policies and work with the judicial system, if needed.

We encourage families and individuals to advocate for their personal goals. Specifically, our annual Legislative Reception, which is co-hosted with the Massachusetts Developmental Disabilities Council, empowers people with disabilities to have their voices heard by their elected officials and provides training to effectively communicate their needs. In addition, The Arc is a leader of the Massachusetts Alliance for 21st Century Policy (MA21 Alliance), which works to protect the rights of people with IDD to choose self-direction.

People with autism and IDD have the right to be fully included in all aspects of community life, including housing, employment, and recreation. The Arc offers a range of webinars and outreach sessions to assist families in their caregiving role and to educate them about available resources. Our Transition Conference, online resources, and information sessions provide self-advocates, parents, educators, and other professionals tools that facilitate positive transitions from school to adulthood.
